Programmes in Canadian Studies

Canadian Studies (Études canadiennes) constitutes both an interdisciplinary field focussing on the study of Canada, and a multidisciplinary crossroad where various social and natural sciences meet, notably political science, literary studies, history and sociology. The Faculté Saint-Jean is a French-language faculty within an English-language university. It is living testimony to an important dimension of the Canadian reality, hence the emergence of its research and study programs in Canadian Studies, with particular emphasis on the theme Francophonies canadiennes et fédéralisme.

Major in Études canadiennes (BA degree)

Students must fulfill the common requirements of the BA degree and the specific requirements of the major. The latter include a minimum of *30 credits at the senior level in courses with Canadian content, and at least *9 credits in ETCAN courses. ETCAN 101, ETCAN 360 and ETCAN 450 are obligatory.

For the minor in Études canadiennes, students must complete a minimum of *15 credits at the senior level in courses with Canadian content, including at least *9 credits in ETCAN courses. ETCAN 101 and ETCAN 360 are obligatory.

Honours in Études canadiennes (Honours BA degree)

Students must complete a minimum of *48 credits at the senior level in courses with Canadian content, including CA FR 350, ETCAN 360, ETCAN 450, HISTE 260, HISTE 261 and SC PO 220. Students must also complete the honours thesis course, ETCAN 520.
